Tim first came to Los Angeles in pursuit of an acting career (the photo shows Tim's first professional headshot!). It was only after living in LA and seeing at first hand the endemic racism and social injustice in the city, and then being forced to resign from a job after protesting against his employer's cruelty to animals, that he decided he needed to do something more meaningful.
