

# **Weekly Message**

Dear Friend,

Leila had been homeless since she was 15. She was addicted to crystal meth (which she couldn't even try to fight, because she was afraid to go to sleep without it), she had severe untreated schizophrenia, and she was seriously malnourished.

She arrived at The Women's Room during the course of a psychotic episode so bad that she could no longer distinguish between reality and delusion. Fortunately, The Women's Room was able to call Street Outreach, and Tish and Olivia got there quickly to deescalate the situation. Olivia tried to get Leila into a mental health facility, but it was too late in the day, so she contacted PORT (Pasadena Outreach Response Team), which was able to get her admitted to Huntington Hospital.

Olivia then referred Leila to FSP (Full Service Partnership - a comprehensive and intensive mental health program for adults with severe and persistent mental illness) and was lucky enough to get her accepted to their program. At the time of this writing, Leila has been stable and clean for two weeks! She is now going to live with her godmother, and we hope that this new stability will enable her to continue to manage her medication and regulate her life.

Our ability to participate in such a far-reaching intervention is due in part to some fantastic inter-agency collaboration (TWR, the Street Outreach team, PORT, Huntington Hospital, and FSP), but also owes a lot to the growth in skills and professionalization of the Street Outreach team. A couple of years ago a situation like Leila's would have been beyond our skill set to address. We are so grateful that the Pasadena community's <u>support of Friends In Deed</u> has empowered us to make a difference in lives like Leila's!
